Mahanoy City Second and Bethlehem Third in Schoolboy Classic at Traylor Stadium—Allentown High Athletes Finish Poorly in Big Field

Lower Merion High annexed the second consecutive championship in the fifth annual championships of District One, P. I. A. A., held at Bethlehem, Saturday afternoon. In winning the Philadelphia suburbans compiled a comfortable margin of points over Mahanoy City, the runner up. Bethlehem High once again came through to capture third place. Allentown High was lost in the shuffle, standing twelfth in the point score.

The evenly balanced teams of Lower Merion, placing in the majority of the events, accounted for the victory. Mahanoy City's excellent showing might be attributed to the individual efforts of Tony Gudatis, big versatile athlete, who was the mainstay of the anthracite representatives.

Gudatis was at his best in the field events and twice shattered a district record when he heaved the discus 123 feet, 2 1-2 inches in the trials and beat this distance in the final with a heave of 128 feet 7 1-2 inches. The record was the only one broken.

Bethlehem High forged into the running by taking first in both sprint events and also the relay. The latter, over a distance of one mile, was a pretty race in which Kulp, running anchor, came from the rear and breast the tape only inches ahead of his nearest competitor.

Runs 9 4-5 Seconds as Charleston Wins

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., May 18.—In a meet featured by the breaking of eight existing State records, Charleston High school annexed the twelfth annual West Virginia scholastic track and field meet which has been held here during the past two days. Gordon Fraser, of Charleston, proved consistent in the 100-yard dash, when he again covered the distance in 9 4-5 seconds to secure the establishment of a new State record, and, incidentally, one which ties the existing national scholastic mark for the distance. Yesterday when he registered 9 4-5 in trials he was aided slightly by wind, but today the air was clear.

The Charleston dash did, however, meet defeat in the 200-yard dash after having equaled the State mark of 22 4-8 seconds in his two qualifying heats. "Jimmy" Givins, Huntington High, bested the Capital City dash and set a new record at 22 2-8 seconds.

A third track record was fractured today when the Parkersburg one-mile relay team broke 3 minutes 36 4-8 seconds in four heat races. The same school had previously held the record at 3 minutes 30 seconds. Yesterday two new track records were established which were not touched today. Huntington's 44 seconds mark for the 440-yard sprint relay and Warehol's 51 2-8 seconds coverage of the quarter-mile. The old sprint relay mark was 43 1-5 seconds, while the previous 440-yard dash mark was 52 seconds. Three field events saw better records established. Johnson put the 12-pound shot 48 feet 7 1/4 inches to better the old mark of 46 feet 1 inch. BRODBECK LEADS PENN. TO TRIUMPH ON LINKS

RYE, N. Y., May 18.—The University of Pennsylvania golf team, led by Al Brodbeck, scored the biggest upset of the current intercollegiate golf season by triumphing over the strong Yale team on the links of the Green Meadow Golf Club here today. The match ended with the Red and Blue players on the long end of a 5 to 4 score.

The steady and consistent playing of Brodbeck decided the issue for the Pennsylvanians. The Mount Vernon youth conquered William Forrest, Yale captain, in a stirring struggle that went to the home green before the Red and Blue player eked out a victory by 2 up. Brodbeck negotiated the first nine holes in 37 and led for rest at the turn by two strokes.

The Yale captain caught up on the return trip, but bowed to his rival on the eighteenth, where Brodbeck clinched the victory with a 12-foot putt for a birdie 4. With his partner, R. L. Hansen, Brodbeck scored the only double victory of the match. They defeated Forrest and Tommy Aycock, 2 up. Hansen had a score of 77 for the round and turned in a best ball count of 70.

Salo Takes Lead in X-Country Run

BIG SPRING, Texas, May 18 (A. P.)—Johnny Salo, Pasak, N. J., policeman, today snatched the lead in the X-Country marathon from Peter Gavazzi, of England, who he had trailed since the runners passed through Ohio.

Salo, by finishing in a tie with Glusto Fink, of Italy, on today's forty-mile leg from Colorado, Texas, established a lead for himself of four minutes and thirty seconds.
