## RIDLEY PARK IN TRACK VICTORY

### Classy Proteges of Cornog Add B Title to Long List in P.I.A.A. Meet

Doc Cornog's red-shirted youngsters from Ridley Park High added another track and field championship to their lengthy list of honors on Saturday afternoon when they scored an easy victory in Class "B" in the District One championships at Franklin field.

The Parkers won four individual championships and accounted for two new records in running up a total of 43 5-6 points, exactly 20 more than second-place Ambler. In Class "A" Norristown won easily with 55 5-6 points, 20 more than Lester Merion, with Chester in sixth place with 14 points.

A total of 13 new marks were created in the two classes, six of them being fractured by Delco lads, who won a total of four first places in Class "B."

Ben Martin, Prospect Park's one-man team, was the scoring star. He won the high jump with a new record height of 6 feet 1 1/2 inches, captured the broad jump with a leap of 20 feet 8 1/2 inches, and was second in the pole vault, exceeding the former record in that event.

Chester failed to win a first place as Walt Boroka, shot putter, was upset by Al Perrien, of Radnor, who won it. Only Class "A" double winner was Coatesville's Billy Norton in the 100 and 200-yard dashes while Wayne Cressman, of Sellersville-Perkasie, won the same events in Class "B" for a double. He also anchored the winning half-mile relay team.

### BIG TIME RACES AT TRENTON OVAL

First Auto Program Is Slated for Sunday, May 28 1939

Trenton, N. J., May 22—New Jersey will get back on the big time automobile racing calendar this month with the scheduling of a six event gasoline program on the State Fair grounds in Trenton on Sunday, May 28, contest board officials of the American Automobile Association have announced here. Sanction for the first spring race meet held here in years has been awarded to Hankinson Speedways of New York and Philadelphia. Entries in the competitive events will include the outstanding drivers of the east, augmented by a strong contingent of crack mid-western stars, according to Ralph A. Hankinson, veteran promoter. The May 28 program is the only auto racing card scheduled for "A" class drivers in the state before the fall circuits at the agricultural fairs open, contest board officials say. It is planned to make a May speed program an annual event in Trenton, linking the half mile course with the Langhorns and Reading, Pa. circuit. With grandstand seating capacity to care for more than 12,000 spectators and one of the best half mile tracks in the country, racing authorities contend that the State Fair plant will become one of the greatest speed centers in the east. Track improvements are already underway and prior to May 28 many tons of calcium chloride will be ap-
