 - To provide for a \$100 fine per sport for schools not submitting eligibility lists in a timely fashion and prohibit participation in postseason competition until the fine is paid.

ARTICLE VI TRANSFERS, RESIDENCE, AND RECRUITING

Section 1. General Provisions.

C. In-Season Transfers.

- 1. Because of the timing difficulties in expeditiously obtaining necessary paperwork, of confirming representations of eligibility, of determining whether such Transfers are opposed by any appropriate party, of promptly scheduling hearings to consider such matters, and to reduce the likelihood of participation by an ineligible student that would impact on competition and the opportunity to participate by other students, a student who Transfers after the student Practices with a school's Team shall be ineligible to participate in that sport in Contests for a period of 21 calendar days following enrollment at the student's new school. The student's eligibility shall thereafter be determined by Sections 3 or 4 of this ARTICLE, as applicable.
- 2. If a student transfers after the student was eligible to participate in at least 50% of the PIAA maximum number of Regular Season Contests in that sport, the student will be deemed to have participated in an entire season and, following the transfer, will not be eligible for further participation in that sport. The District Committee may waive this period of ineligibility upon demonstration by the student that the transfer was not materially motivated by an athletic purpose and that the transfer was necessitated by exceptional or unusual circumstances that compelled a transfer prior to the end of the season. For purposes of this provision, transfers to address academic needs and desires, or for social reasons, are not considered exceptional and compelling circumstances.

Section 2. Eligibility for Post Season Championship Tournaments (effective for transfers occurring on or after August 6, 2018).

PREAMBLE: Beginning at the District level, PIAA sponsors championship tournaments for its member schools in a number of sports. PIAA has a significant interest is in promoting fair and equitable competition for these championship tournaments and has determined that transfers can, and often do, dramatically shift the competitive balance. Such transfers, particularly when those occur prior to the junior or senior years, have substantially undermined the confidence of the membership and public generally in the integrity and fairness of the entire post-season system. For that reason, the Board of Directors has determined that, with few exceptions, any students who transfer after playing a sport in their 10th grade year shall not be eligible to participate in the ensuing PIAA tournament in that sport. The student, if otherwise eligible, may participate in that sport only during the regular season.

- A. General Rule: Irrespective of any other provision of this ARTICLE, a student who participated in a sport in 10th grade or thereafter and, following completion of such season, transfers to another school is ineligible participation in the postseason (District championship tournament and thereafter) in that sport for a period of one year following the date of transfer.
- B. Waiver of General Rule: A District Committee may waive this period of ineligibility upon demonstration by the student that the transfer was necessitated by exceptional and unusual circumstances beyond the reasonable control of the student's family. For purposes of this provision, the following reasons WILL be deemed sufficient to meet this standard:
 - A change of residence necessitated by a change in employment;
 - A school-initiated administrative transfer within a school district;
 - A court ordered transfer;
 - A change of schools caused by a military reassignment of a parent;
 - A change of schools caused by release from a juvenile facility; and
 - A demonstrable change in income or other financial resources that compels withdrawal from a private school.

For purposes of this provision, the following reasons will NOT be deemed to meet this standard:

- A transfer for academic, developmental, spiritual and/or social reasons; and
- A change of residence resulting from a family separation, unless court approved.

All other tendered reasons will be considered by the District Committee on a case-by-case basis.

E. Open Gyms.

This activity as defined in the glossary is to encourage participation in a sport. Open Gyms are limited to two hours per day and three days per calendar week outside the defined sport season during the school year.

Weight training and conditioning activities are not considered Open Gyms and may be held daily so

long as they are voluntary and not compulsory.

Effective August 13, 2018: Within 10 days prior to the start of each sports season, no student enrolled at a PIAA member school may participate in any competition on a team on which other players are also enrolled at that student's school.

Classification of Schools - Preamble

The purpose of classifying schools is to allow for schools to compete within certain parameters against similar size schools. This classification process has involved using enrollment numbers to establish a school's classification that has stood the test of time for decades. However, there is general view that enrollment numbers may not clearly indicate equal competition factors and there should be additional items that are needed to be considered in the classification process to keep athletic competition in balance. With the changes in legislation and the advancement of technology that have affected types of schools that students may choose to attend, there appear to be two general types of schools: **traditional schools**, where students attend by virtue of their geographic residence, and **schools of choice**, where students choose to attend based upon their educational needs, religion, gender, legacy or technology. These schools also include academies, charters and preparatory schools. Based upon these changes in the types of schools that students may attend, consideration needs to be given to address competitive balance and the development of a formula to address this process of classifying schools.

<u>COMPETITION CLASSIFICATION FORMULA:</u> A school's competition classification will be determined by sport and gender using the following formula. All three items will be combined to determine the competition classification.

Enrollment classification + Success factor + Athletic transfers = Competition Classification

#1 - Enrollment classification

All schools will be classified by enrollment of grades 9-10-11 in the odd numbered calendar years by sport and by gender. This is standard procedure.

#2 - Success factor

All schools will have their success in post-regular season rated by the following scale.

1 point for participation in an entry level inter-district championship contest.

2 points for participation in a quarter-final inter-district contest.

3 points for participation in a semi-final inter-district contest.

- 4 points for points for participation in a final inter-district contest.
 - A. In the previous two year cycle, schools will receive points based upon their highest finish in post-season. If a school's team achieves 6 points or greater, the school may move up 1 classification for the next classification cycle in that sport and gender based upon the number of transfers the school received under the transfer formula.
 - B. If a school that participates in a higher enrollment classification obtains 3, 4, or 5 success points cumulative in the two year cycle, the school will remain in that higher enrollment classification for the next two year cycle.

#3 - Athletic Transfers

Schools may receive transfer students without affecting their classification if the student enters their new school during the traditional natural break (8th grade to 9th grade). Any sport specific transfer after the natural break transfer will subject the student to a possible post-season ban for one year if the transfer is after being eligible to participate of a 10th grade season and based upon the district committee or regional panel determination of eligibility.

A. In the previous two year classification cycle, if a school receives 6 points in the previous classification cycle and accepts transfer students by sport and gender that are equal to or exceeds 1 less than half of the starting squad size of that sport, the school will move up 1 classification.

Example:

- 2 transfers in basketball= up 1 classification.
- 5 transfers in football = up 1 classification.
- B. If a school accumulates 6 points or greater in the previous cycle and does not receive transfer students, it will remain in their same enrollment classification for the next two year cycle.
- C. A school that has moved up in class does not obtain 3, 4, or 5 success points in a cycle, but has transfer students equal to or exceeds the number by sport will remain up in that classification cycle for the next two year cycle.

Appeals

A school would be allowed to appeal its upgrade in competition classification by providing written documentation to the Executive Staff to verify that changes in their classification will not provide them with a competitive advantage over like sized schools. The school's rationale to not move up in classification must be included in the appeal documents.

The appeal will be held upon the paperwork of all school related documents (certificates of eligibility; transcripts; attendance records; CIPPE forms; previous two year cycle team schedules and results). Documentation must be provided to the Executive Staff. If the Executive Staff makes a positive determination to accept the appeal, the appeal will end. If the Executive Staff rejects this appeal, the decision may be appealed to the Board of Directors.

Compliance Committee

The Compliance Committee may be appointed by the Executive Director. A Compliance Committee may also be requested by a district committee, regional panel or Board of Directors to assess possible deficiencies and weaknesses in school oversight of its athletic programs as well as possible violations of PIAA rules, regulations, policies, procedures or provisions of the Constitution and By-Laws. This committee will have full investigative authority and will be authorized to verify the eligibility of all student-athletes in complying with the provisions pertaining to student-athletes of the PIAA By-Laws. The Committee will report to a district committee, regional panel or Board of Directors, each of which may thereafter take appropriate remedial action.

Q & A for Competition Formula:

Basic Formula:

In the previous two year classification cycle, if a school receives 6 points in the previous classification cycle and accepts transfer students by sport and gender that are equal to or exceeds 1 less than half of the starting squad size of that sport, the school will move up 1 classification.

Example:

2 transfers in basketball= up 1 classification.

5 transfers in football = up 1 classification.

If a school accumulates 6 points or greater in the previous cycle and does not receive transfer students, it will remain in their same enrollment classification for the next two year cycle.

A school that has moved up in class does not obtain 3, 4, 5 or 6 success points in a cycle, but has transfer students equal to or exceeds the number by sport, will remain up in the higher classification cycle for the next two year cycle.

If a school accumulates 6 or more success points in a classification cycle – do they automatically move up in classification?

<u>Answer</u>: No. They do not go up automatically, but if they equal or exceed the number of success points and equal or exceed the minimum number of transfer students, they will move up in classification for two years.

If a school has more than the listed number of transfers and no success points do they move up in classification?

Answer: No. They will not move up based only upon the number of transfer students they host. They also have to obtain the minimum number of success points to move up in classification.

If a school moves up in classification for two years can they move back down?

Answer: Yes. If they do not achieve any success points that would keep them up (minimally three points), then they may be able to move back down. However, they also must have less than the minimum number of transfers students to move back down.

If a school moves up in classification in one cycle can they move up another in the next cycle?

Answer: Yes. If a school moves up in class and achieves six or more success points and equals or exceeds the minimum number of transfers per sport, they could move up another classification based upon their success and number of transfers.

What keeps a school from moving up or down after the first cycle; success or transfers or both?

Answer: If a school moves up after the first cycle and does not equal or exceed the minimum number of success points (3), they may move down if they do not equal or exceed the minimum number of transfers.

If a school moves up in classification can transfers only keep them up in that classification?

Answer: Yes. If they have transfers that equal or exceed the minimum number of transfers, then they stay up in classification.

PAOC Meeting - September 5, 2018 @ Heinz Field, Pittsburgh, PA

Superintendents from Western PA are naming themselves the PIAA Equity Committee and hosted a meeting July 25, 2018 in State College to discuss their intent to separate PIAA championships into public and private divisions. The private divisions will also include charter schools.

At the meeting of the PAOC on September 5, 2018, this group has been directed by Senator Jay Costa D - Allegheny- to follow the PIAA process to have their voice heard at the Board of Directors' level by working through their elected representatives that have seats upon the Board. We are hearing that this is being followed and the Board will most likely to receive requests through various sources.

PIAA's position on this situation is as follows from the testimony given on September 5th.

HB 2104 - 1972 Legislation to allow private school membership into PIAA - The 1972 legislation that mandated PIAA to include private schools is very clear in its intent to have private schools participate with public schools for PIAA championships. Public schools already played private schools in regular season games, but it was the post-season ban that infuriated some private schools and got the attention of Representative Frank from Allentown who initiated legislation in the spring of 1972. HB 2104 passed the House of Representatives unanimously with the initial language that stated, "authorizing private schools to participate with public schools in post-season athletic events".

Both PIAA and the Pennsylvania Catholic Interscholastic Athletic Association (PCIAA) opposed the legislation and were unsuccessful in their initial attempts to change it. However, before final adoption, the General Assembly allowed PIAA and the PCIAA to engage in dialogue to reach a compromise on how competition would occur. This was important since there was no initial mention that private schools had to be members of PIAA and what eligibility standards they needed to follow. The language of the bill was specific "authorizing private schools to participate with public schools in post-season athletic events."

The final result of HB 2104 was to amend the language to state, "private schools shall be permitted, if otherwise qualified, to be members of the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association". This was passed by the Senate on July 6, 1972. This modification allowed PIAA to have private schools meet the same eligibility standards, pay membership dues and become members of PIAA consistent with all other member schools. Governor Shapp signed this into law October 16, 1972.

At the December 8, 1972 PIAA Board of Directors' meeting, PIAA admitted 29 private schools into its membership and some of these schools participated with public schools in that season's 1972-73 PIAA Basketball Championships. President Pro Tempore Joseph Scarnati eloquently stated in an Op-Ed piece of August 8, 2018 "The intent of the 1972 law was clear. Lawmakers sought to end the segregation of non-public schools in order to allow all schools and students to compete for state championships". He further stated, "while this system is not perfect, the organization works tirelessly to ensure competitive balance between public, private and charter schools is preserved."

The Board has done exactly what Senator Scarnati relates and it is consistent with the vast majority of similar state associations nationwide. In a survey conducted by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) where 46 states responded, 5 states are public school associations only. Of the remaining 41 state associations, 37 provide for common post-season competition for public and private schools.



PIAA ARTICLE VI TRANSFER, RESIDENCE and RECRUITING

Section 1, C - In-Season Transfers "21 Day Rule" / "50% Rule" Section 2 - Post Season Eligibility

FAQ'S:

Who does the In-Season "21 Day Rule" apply to?

A student who transfers after practicing and/or playing with their former school's team.

What if the student wants to play a different sport?

 The "21 Day Rule" would not apply ... the rule applies to students who play the same sport at their previous school.

When does the "21 day Rule" sit out begin?

· 21 Calendar Days following enrollment at the student's new school

Can the student practice during the 21 Day sit out period?

 Yes – the student can practice once all physical and school eligibility requirements are met.

When is the In-Season "50% Rule" applied?

 When a student transfers to a new school after they have been eligible to participate in 50% of the PIAA's maximum number of contests in that sport.

Example: a Soccer player transfers to a new school after the 10th game of the season. The student's season would be considered completed.

Does the "50% Rule" count the # of games played?

No – the rule considers the number of contests the student was eligible to play.

Who does the "Post Season Transfer Rule" apply to and what does it mean?

Students who transfer after playing a sport in their 10th grade year or thereafter, are
eligible to participate in all regular season contests, but will be ineligible for post season
contests.



FAQ'S (cont.):

What if an 11th or 12th grade transfer student did not play a sport at their old school?

· The "Post-Season Rule" would not apply to the student.

Can a student ineligible for the Post-Season participate in District playoffs?

 No - the "Post-Season Rule" includes all District and PIAA playoff and championship events.

Can a school / student appeal the Transfer Rule(s)?

- "21 Day Rule" No appeal or waiver
- "50% Rule" / "Post-Season Rule" Yes, the District Committee may consider an appeal. The Request for a Decision of Eligibility form must be filled out and submitted through the PIAA Portal.

What reasons can a District Committee consider a waiver?


- · Change of residence necessitated by Employment / Military reassignment
- · School initiated Administrative transfer / Court ordered transfer
- · Demonstrable change of income or resources
- Court approved family separation
- Other considerations on a case by case basis

What reasons for transfers cannot be considered by a District Committee?

· Transfers to address academic, developmental, spiritual and/or social reasons

Who is responsible for knowing if a student is eligible or ineligible?

· School Administration is responsible for certifying the eligibility of all contestants
