FIVE NEW RECORDS SET, ONE A STATE STANDARD

Allentown, Pa., May 15.— Lower Merion High School won the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association district championship, sponsored by Muhlenberg College, here this afternoon. The Main Line youngsters registered 48½ points in a meet in which four meet marks and one State record were shattered. The schools finished as follows:

First. Lower Merion, 48½; second, Norristown, 36½; third, Bethlehem, 26; fourth, Chester, 17; fifth, Lansdale, 12; sixth, Reading, 9½; seventh. Tamaqua, 0; eighth, Allentown, 7; ninth, Abington, 5; tenth, West Reading, 4; eleventh, Lehighton, 3.

Birdsboro, Coaldalo and Palmerton High did not place. In the preliminary contests in the morning, Kline of Lanedale, shattered the Pennsylvania scholastic record for the century, clipping off one-fifth of a second by running the distance in 10 cflat. 




